**A bylaw to amend Boat Launch and Parking Lot Regulation Bylaw No. 970**

**WHEREAS** the Village of Harrison Hot Springs has deemed it advisable to amend Boat Launch and Parking Lot Regulation bylaw No. 970, 2011;

**NOW THEREFORE** in open meeting assembled, the Mayor and Council of the Village of Harrison Hot Springs enacts as follows:

**1. CITATION**

This Bylaw may be cited for all purposes as the "Village of Harrison Hot Springs Boat Launch and Parking Lot Regulation Amendment Bylaw No. 1007, 2012."

**2. AMENDMENT**

On page 1 a new section be added:

**2. DEFINITIONS**

**"Same Day"** means calendar day.

The subsequent sections are to be renumbered.

On page 1, the following sections are amended to read:

3. That a day pass allows the holder to launch and retrieve a boat from the boat launch ramp and to park one towing vehicle and one boat trailer only in the boat launch parking area for the same day (provided parking space is available).
4. That a seasons pass for the use of the facilities may be purchased each year, payable in advance. A seasons pass entitles the holder to launch and retrieve one boat from the boat launch ramp and to park one towing vehicle and one boat trailer only for the same day (provided parking space is available).

5. As an alternative to purchasing a seasons pass, an applicant may purchase a fleet pass, payable in advance at the Village Office. A fleet pass entitles the holder to only launch and retrieve boats that the holder may own, lease, charter or broker and that have been registered with the Village Office under the fleet pass. Each registered boat on the fleet pass is entitled to park one towing vehicle and one boat trailer only for the same day (provided parking space is available).
  
6. Any day pass, seasons pass or fleet pass holder that requires parking beyond the included same day limit, must purchase an additional parking pass from the boat launch attendant for the required amount of days.

# Executive Summary

High-quality transit service is a foundational component of managing growth and fostering sustainability within communities. Greater provision of transit service increases the range of transportation options available to the travelling public. The transit market potential within the Chilliwack Area, which includes Chilliwack, Agassiz, Harrison, Hope and the Fraser Valley Regional District areas adjacent to Chilliwack, is increasingly important to address climate change, to accommodate population and employment growth, to manage traffic and to support an aging demographic.

This plan has been created for the Chilliwack Area, which is located in the eastern portion of the Fraser Valley, focusing on Chilliwack, Kent, Harrison Hot Springs and Hope. These communities are connected by three major highways: Highway 1, which runs south of the Fraser River, Highway 7, which runs along the north side of the Fraser and Highway 9 which links Harrison in the north to Highway 1 in the south. The transit services provided in this area of the Region include local services in Chilliwack and a regional service connecting Harrison, Agassiz (Kent community centre) and Chilliwack. Today, there are no transit services to Hope.

The population for the Chilliwack Area is forecast to increase from 107,400<sup>1</sup> in 2011 to 162,500 by 2036. The number of registered vehicles will continue to increase with population; increasing the annual number of kilometers travelled and the level of air pollutants and greenhouse gases emitted. To help build a sustainable future in the Chilliwack Area, this plan has been designed to increase transit's mode share from one to two per cent by 2036, which means an increase from 491,000 annual rides today, to 1.9 million annual rides in 2036.

The Transit Future Plan envisions the Chilliwack Area's transit network 25 years from now and describes the services, infrastructure and investments that will be required to get there.

## Goals

The Transit Future Plan is designed to achieve five goals:

**1. Transit is efficient and cost effective**

Transit is designed to optimize the use of resources and provide better value to the residents and businesses, resulting in improved value of transit investments and increased productivity.

**2. Transit service is designed to complement and support the diverse land use patterns and community types**

The Chilliwack Area contains communities that range in size from a few hundred to over 90,000 residents. Serving this diverse array of communities, from urban centres to rural communities requires tailored transit service that is appropriately sized.

**3. Transit service is reliable, safe, convenient, and integrated with other transportation modes**

The Chilliwack Area Transit Future Plan places a strong emphasis on the customer. This goal focuses on the best practices that make transit attractive and convenient to customers. Transit is fast and direct, safe, convenient, accessible, modern and attractive. Transit is integrated with the transportation network, especially pedestrian and cycling networks.

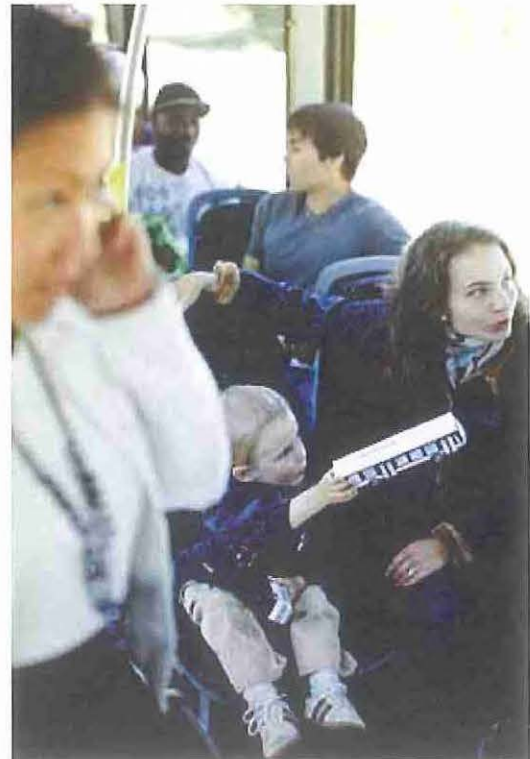
**4. Improve the image and marketing of transit through excellent customer service and communication**

Transit relies on its operators, marketing, customer information, and fare products for its public image. To improve the image of transit, operators are excellent customer service agents. Customer information is widely available and accessible and fare products are diverse and easily attainable.

**5. Service contributes to environmental sustainability**

Transit contributes to the reduction of greenhouse gases, promotes healthy living, and encourages and supports more walkable and compact land use patterns.

The Transit Future plan target for transit mode share is two per cent, or approximately double the current mode share for transit. This target translates to approximately 1.9 million riders annually.



## The Transit Future Network

The Transit Future network is comprised of three layers of transit service that together create a comprehensive transit network that meets the needs of Chilliwack and the surrounding area over the next 25 years.

### Frequent Transit Network (FTN)

Frequent Transit service provides medium to high density land use corridors with a convenient, reliable, and frequent transit service all day long (15 minutes or better, 15 hours a day, 7 days a week). The FTN will carry the largest share of the transit system's ridership. This justifies capital investments such as transit priority, right-of-way improvements, a high level of transit stop amenities, and corridor branding.

### Local Transit Network (LTN)

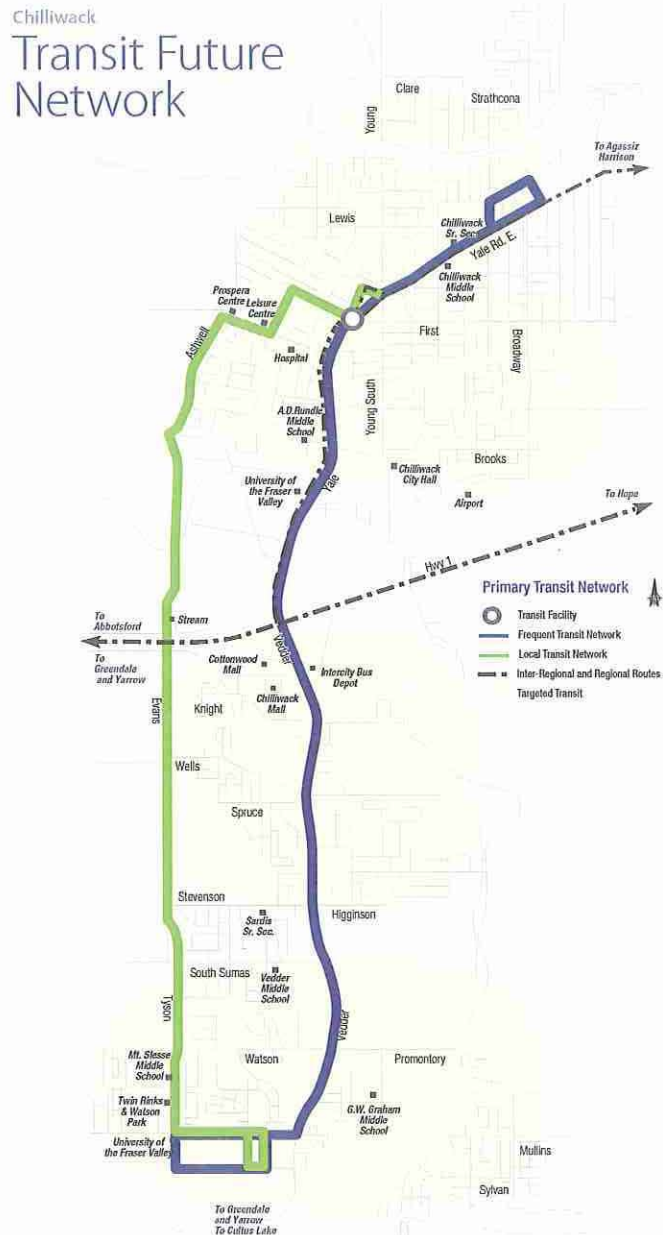
The LTN is designed to connect neighbourhoods to local destinations and to the FTN. Frequency and vehicle type are selected based on demand.

### Targeted Services

Targeted transit services are a collection of transit services that include handyDART, regional, express, and para-transit services.

In 2036, service in the Chilliwack Area will include FTN and LTN routes within the City of Chilliwack. Regional services will also connect communities in the Chilliwack Area and Chilliwack and Abbotsford. Inter-regional service will connect Metro Vancouver with Abbotsford and Mission. Custom transit service is also an integral part of future service provision recognizing the average age of the population is projected to increase over the next 25 years.

Establishing the Transit Future network requires prioritizing transit investments and developing an implementation strategy to transform today's network into the future network. The implementation strategy for the Chilliwack Area has three horizons: near-term, short-term, and medium to long-term.



## Near-term improvements

The near-term service improvements are planned for implementation in summer of 2012 and are focused in the Chilliwack urban area. The near-term improvements are based on a new route structure that removes most existing routes and replaces them with new, more direct and frequent routes.

### Implementation of the Yale-Vedder Line

- Establish a network spine with 20 minute frequency along Yale-Vedder, which will directly connect downtown, Sardis, and South Chilliwack

### Realignment of Local Routes

- Provide direct connections from neighbourhoods to the spine with three new routes that operate at 30 or 60 minute frequencies

## Short-term improvements

### ► *Chilliwack local service*

#### Improved Sunday Service

- Extend Sunday service hours to 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Routes 1 – 4
- Increase the frequency of Route 1-Vedder to 30 minutes on Sundays

#### Holiday Service

- Introduce transit service with the same service hours and frequencies as Sunday service on public holidays

#### Improved Local Service Frequency

- Increase Route 1 frequency to 15 minutes during weekdays and Saturdays
- Increase Route 2 frequency to 30 minutes on weekdays and Saturdays
- Increase Route 4 service to 30 minutes during peak periods on weekdays

#### Custom transit improvements to span of service

- Extend custom transit service hours to 6:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. from Monday to Friday, 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. on Saturdays, and 9:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Sundays
- Add an additional custom transit vehicle to provide more service during peak periods

#### Review of Downtown Chilliwack's Transit Exchange

- Consider the location, capacity, and amenities for a transit exchange that will serve Chilliwack over the next 25 years

### ► *Regional Service*

#### Establish the Abbotsford-Chilliwack Express (ACE)

- Provide Highway Express service on Highway 1 between Abbotsford and Chilliwack with 30 minute frequency during peak times and 60 minute frequency during off peak periods

### **Increased Service between Chilliwack – Agassiz–Harrison**

- Provide hourly service between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m.
- Provide Sunday service year round
- Expand evening service as demand warrants

### **Feasibility study for service to Hope**

- Provide access to key destinations and connect directly to both north-south routes (Vedder and Evans)
- Increase frequency to 30 minutes or better in peak periods

#### **Expanding Custom Service**

- Extend custom transit service hours to match conventional transit service hours
- Add additional custom transit vehicles to allow spontaneous travel during peak periods

#### **Enhancing Service to Cultus Lake**

- Consider year round service
- Consider adding trips in peak periods
- Consider extending the service day

#### **Enhancing Service to Yarrow and Greendale**

- Schedule more trips during the weekdays
- Schedule additional trips on weekends if there is an increase in demand

### Introduce transit service to Hope

- Based on the results of the feasibility study conducted, implement a regional service connecting Hope to Chilliwack.

### Feasibility study for Hwy 7 service between Kent and Mission

- Complete a feasibility study to determine the most appropriate type, level of service, timing and costs to provide service along Hwy 7 between Kent and Mission.

## Moving Forward

### Funding the Plan

To meet the mode share and ridership targets identified for the Chilliwack Area will require significant capital and operating investments in the transit system over the next 25 years. Conventional transit annual service hours are expected to increase from 21,000 hours to 86,000 hours. The plan also calls for capital investments, which include:

- Expanding the transit fleet from 9 – 36 vehicles
- New transit exchange in the City of Chilliwack
- Improvements to customer amenities at transit stops

This level of investment in transit will require stable revenue sources, increased predictability of funding, and implementing new partnerships and revenue opportunities.

### Implementing the Plan

The Implementation Strategy directs short-term to long-term investment in the Chilliwack Area and informs the three-year service planning process. This process aims to provide a closer link to local government budgeting processes in order to ensure that funding availability is better aligned with local needs and provincial funding. This is accomplished by providing three-year base budgets, and proposed service expansion cost estimates by year.

### Keys to Success

BC Transit has begun to take steps to guide the Transit Future Plan from a vision to a reality. These efforts will only be successful if done in partnership with all local governments in the Fraser Valley, the Regional District, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure, and the community. A continuous and open dialogue is required to ensure strong links between land use and transit planning, provincial and regional transportation planning and transit, and transportation policy and funding availability.

BYLAW NO. 948

A bylaw to regulate the non-essential use of pesticides

**WHEREAS** residents of the Village of Harrison Hot Springs are concerned about the non-essential use of pesticides and the risks that they may pose to the health and well-being of the environment and residents;

**AND WHEREAS** the application of pesticides contributes to the cumulative chemical load absorbed by the natural environment;

**AND WHEREAS** pesticides cannot be necessarily confined to a single location, but move through the environment in the air, land and water and may have an impact on non-target organisms and plants;

**AND WHEREAS** alternatives to the application of pesticides exist;

**AND WHEREAS** the Precautionary Principle of international law supports local governments anticipating and preventing threats of harm to the environment, even if some cause-and-effect relationships are not fully established scientifically;

**AND WHEREAS**, pursuant to the *Community Charter* and the *Spheres of Concurrent Jurisdiction – Environment and Wildlife Regulation*, the Council of the Village of Harrison Hot Springs may pass bylaws regulating the application of pesticides;

**NOW THEREFORE** the Council of the Village of Harrison Hot Springs, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

1. **CITATION**

This Bylaw may be cited for all purposes as the "Village of Harrison Hot Springs Pesticide Use Bylaw No. 948", 2010.

2. **DEFINITION**

a) In this Bylaw,

"**Bylaw Enforcement Officer**" means for the Village of Harrison Hot Springs or any other person designated by Council;

"**Council**" means the Council of the Village of Harrison Hot Springs;

"**Permitted Pesticide**" means a Pesticide as listed in the attached Schedule A;

"**Pest**" means an injurious, noxious or troublesome living organism, but does not include a virus, bacteria, fungus or internal parasite that exists on or in humans or animals;

**"Pesticide"** means a micro-organism or material that is represented, sold, used or intended to be used to prevent, destroy, repel or mitigate a Pest, and includes:

- (i) a plant growth regulator, plant defoliator or plant desiccant;
- (ii) a control product as defined in the *Pest Control Products Act* (Canada); and
- (iii) a substance that is classified as a Pesticide by the *Integrated Pest Management Act* (British Columbia).

**"Private Land"** means a parcel or a part of a parcel if the parcel or part is used for residential purposes in the Village of Harrison Hot Springs but does not include residential areas of farms;

**"Public Land"** means land vested in the Village of Harrison Hot Springs; and

**"Village"** means the Village of Harrison Hot Springs.

### 3. REGULATION

No person shall use or apply a Pesticide or grant the permission or authority, express or implied, to use or apply a pesticide for the purpose of maintaining outdoor trees, shrub, flowers, other ornamental plants and turf on, in, under or upon any Private Land or Public Land.

### 4. EXCEPTION

- a) Section 3 does not apply to the use or application of a Pesticide:
  - i) that is a Permitted Pesticide
  - ii) To manage pests that transmit human diseases,
  - iii) To manage pests that impact agriculture or forestry,
  - iv) To buildings or inside buildings, or
  - v) On land used for agriculture, forestry, transportation, public utilities or pipelines.

### 5. OFFENCES

- 1) Any person who contravenes any provision of this Bylaw shall be guilty of an offence and shall, upon summary conviction thereof, be liable to a minimum penalty of \$500.00 and a maximum fine of \$10,000.
- 2) Each day that an offence continues shall constitute a separate offence against this Bylaw.

### 6. ENFORCEMENT

- 1) This Bylaw is designated under the provisions of Section 264 of the *Community Charter* as a Bylaw that may be enforced by means of a Bylaw Enforcement Notice and in accordance with this Bylaw.

2) Bylaw Enforcement Officers are designated to enforce this Bylaw pursuant to Section 264(1)(b) of the *Community Charter*.

7. Appendix "A", Permitted Pesticides attached hereunto forms part of this Bylaw.

**British Columbia residents support continued use of pest control products  
– a recent poll says**

**August 17, 2011, Ottawa, ON** – A new survey shows the majority of British Columbians favour the continued use of pesticides around their homes and in public green spaces, as opposed to having a province-wide ban on these products.

“There is a misperception that most residents want a ban,” said Shannon Coombs, President of the Canadian Consumer Specialty Products Association (CCSPA), which commissioned the study. “The results of this poll clearly reflect it is only a minority of the population, especially when residents are asked about specific pest problems and scenarios.”

The poll presented respondents with eight potential scenarios. Responses to these scenarios included:

**Insect control**

- 88% of those surveyed indicated insect control by homeowners inside their residences should be allowed (65%) or allowed under certain circumstances (23%). This number climbed to 92% support when respondents were asked if professional insect control inside homes should be allowed or allowed under certain circumstances.
- 73% of respondents said homeowners should also be allowed or allowed under certain circumstances to use insect control products on their lawns and gardens. This number increased to 84% if the pesticides were to be applied by trained operators.

**Weed control**

- 64% of respondents indicated homeowners should be allowed to use weed control products on their lawns and gardens. 70% of respondents said trained or licensed operators should be allowed to use these products on privately owned lawns and gardens.

When looking at all eight potential scenarios covered by the poll, 25% of respondents said pest control products should be allowed for all scenarios; and 83% said “yes” to at least one scenario. It is important to note that less than 10% said “no” to six or more of the eight scenarios and only 2% said “no” to every scenario.

The poll also highlights that 69% of British Columbia (B.C.) residents trust Health Canada’s regulation of the sale and use of pest control products and 58% of residents are aware of the provincial government’s role in ensuring relevant information is provided to consumers at point of purchase. These data indicate the B.C. Government has an excellent opportunity to reach out to consumers even more and provide value-added information.

"This study shows the majority of B.C. residents are confident they can use pest control products safely and they want to continue to have the option to do so. Clearly they see the benefits of these products," said Ms. Coombs.

"This consumer research is critical to shaping future policies in British Columbia regarding the safe use of our members' products," Ms. Coombs said. "We believe the B.C. Government should take a thoughtful approach to ensuring consumers have the tools they need to keep their homes and public spaces safe. B.C. has the opportunity to lead all provinces on this issue in a scientific and responsible manner, and our association is willing to work with the Government to achieve that collective goal."

The CCSPA is a national trade association representing the consumer, industrial and institutional specialty products industry.

This poll was administered using Vision Critical, Angus Reid's B.C. online panel, representative of B.C. residents aged 18 and over. It was fielded on July 6 and 7, 2011, and is considered accurate to within +/- 3.4 per cent, 19/20 times. Why does BC government want to ban pesticides with same risks as pickles and cell phones?

The busybody tendencies of BC politicians are leading to the further regulation of what had previously been the refuge of green thumbs across the province: green lawns, colorful flower beds, and ripening vegetable gardens.

As of early July, the BC government has been reviewing the feasibility of further regulating your private garden by adopting ill-conceived laws restricting pesticide use that do not accurately reflect the current state of scientific knowledge. A hasty ban on the cosmetic use of artificial pesticides should not be implemented until the underlying science is conclusive and a comprehensive analysis of the potential side effects resulting from the ban has been undertaken.

By banning pesticides for cosmetic uses, BC would be following the questionable precedent set by several other provinces. For example, Ontario has restricted the sale and use of more than 250 pesticide products and 80 pesticide ingredients. These provincial prohibitions on cosmetic use of artificial pesticides may apply to lawns, vegetable and ornamental gardens, driveways, cemeteries, public parks and school grounds. Similarly, dozens of municipalities across Canada have introduced their own restrictions on cosmetic pesticide use.

The justification for a ban on the cosmetic use of artificial pesticides is based on the 'precautionary principle' which concludes that any activity that might potentially constitute a "threat of harm" on humans or the ecosystem should be curtailed or abated regardless of whether a "cause-and-effect" relationship has been concretely established.

For example, the Canadian Cancer Society argues that the current evidence of a connection between cancer and artificial pesticide exposure is sufficient to justify a ban, despite readily admitting that no "cause-and-effect" relationship has been "established scientifically."

Yet many of the artificial pesticides that would be banned are not proven to be carcinogenic. For example, the World Health Organization only lists the common pesticide 2,4-D in the same cancer risk category as pickled vegetables and cell phones. And just recently, the United States Environmental Protection Agency conducted a review of the scientific literature and concluded that there was no evidence of a link between cancer and 2,4-D.

If we take the 'precautionary principle' to its natural conclusion, governments should also be banning household soap. Scientists at Cornell University have developed the Environmental Impact Quotient (EIQ) as a measure of the relative impact of common pesticide ingredients on humans and the environment. The EIQ is actually lower for many artificial pesticides than the EIQ for many other mundane household items and 'natural' pesticide alternatives. For example, the EIQ for soap is higher than the EIQ for the common pesticide ingredient 2,4-D.

While politicians may think they're doing good, a ban on the use of artificial pesticides for cosmetic purposes imposes costs on many British Columbians. The existence of a market for pesticides for cosmetic use suggests that Canadians derive value from having these

landscape enhancing products available for purchase. Prohibiting the cosmetic use of artificial pesticides ignores the benefits Canadians enjoy in maintaining aesthetically pleasing green landscapes.

Furthermore, a blanket prohibition on cosmetic pesticide use lacks the careful contrasting of costs and benefits that should be undertaken before any possible regulations are adopted. A wiser approach to evaluating the merits of any regulation controlling cosmetic pesticide use would weigh the trade-offs implied by the proposed regulation.

Making matters worse, a blanket ban might also encourage individuals to substitute the banned product with alternatives that can be potentially more hazardous. Consider the recent case of a Victoria couple who accidentally set their home ablaze while trying to eradicate their weed problem with a blow torch, since artificial pesticide use is banned in Victoria.

Though this case is anecdotal, it lends credibility to the assertion that using public policy to subvert market forces and regulate the availability of certain commodities that might potentially pose some kind of a risk is likely to give birth to other risks. These other risks arise from the sometimes clever, sometimes careless, ways Canadians adapt to altered incentives resulting from regulation.

BC politicians should avoid enacting poorly designed regulations to control pesticide use that may ultimately prove more damaging than the pesticides themselves.

## Pesticides in Canada are safe to use

A provincewide ban on all products is not justified because strict regulations based on scientific research already protect our health

If history has taught us anything, it's that important decisions should never be based on emotion. That's the more true when it comes to significant public policy decisions made by governments. Think about it. How many times have we seen politicians make decisions based on polling in an effort to boost their own popularity without giving proper thought or consideration to the facts or impact of that decision? It's too many to list.

Yet, in a recent opinion piece, the Canadian Cancer Society and the Canadian Association of Physicians for the Environment (CAPE) argue exactly this type of failed approach — advocating for a provincewide ban on pesticides because some polling suggests that people would support such a move. Whether that's true or not, surely we can all agree that facts and science should guide regulation of pesticides.

Unfortunately those advocating a ban disagree because in this case, the facts are not on their side. And when the facts don't support their position, activists prefer to ignore them. But here's the reality: Pesticides are currently one of the most regulated products you will ever come across. Before any pesticide can be sold in Canada must undergo an exhaustive and comprehensive scientific review and safety assessment by Health Canada's Pest Management Regulatory Agency, which is mandated to ensure the protection of human health and the environment. Utilizing the strictest health and safety standards anywhere in the world, Health Canada carefully views all scientific evidence and decides before a pesticide product may be approved for sale and use.

Recognizing the need to continue to lead in the protection of human health, the federal government reviewed and updated pesticide legislation in 2006, providing Canadians with the strongest protection on a global scale. Specifically, pesticides undergo more than 200 separate tests addressing every possible health and environmental issue imaginable. Virtually no other consumer product has been subject to the same level of scientific scrutiny and regulatory oversight

as pesticides.

In their opinion piece, the Canadian Cancer Society and CAPE name the most common weed control product 2, 4-D as warranting particular concern. What they neglect to say is that in May 2008, Health Canada released the findings of an extensive review of 2, 4-D that considered all

potential environmental and health impacts — including special considerations for children, pregnant women and the elderly — and found no evidence to support allegations that 2, 4-D is harmful to our health. In fact, Health Canada concluded Canadians can continue to use the product and stated, "risks to homeowners

and their children from contact with treated lawns and turf are not of concern." The exact same position was also taken by regulatory agencies in the European Union, the United States and the World Health Organization.

In making their argument, these two groups advocate the use of so-called "natural" products. However, what

they don't mention is that Health Canada recognizes that "natural" does not equal safe and, as a result, all pesticides — regardless of whether they are natural or synthetic — are subject to the same scrutiny. While the marketing of "natural" pest control products may make them popular, it is not scientifically sound.

So why do these groups persist in their misinformation campaign?

The CBC's *Marketplace* recently analyzed the national Canadian Cancer Society's financial reports going back 12 years. They discovered that the Society's spending on research had dropped dramatically, from 40.3 per cent in 2000 to under 22 per cent in 2011, while its spending on administration and fundraising has substantially increased from 26 per cent of monies raised in 2000 to 42.7 per cent in 2011.

While the CBC profile dealt specifically with the national Canadian Cancer Society, the B.C. and Yukon division's financial records show a similar trend of decreased spending on research (down \$1.5 million in 2010 from 2005) with a corresponding increase in expenditures on revenue development.

By loudly championing causes such as this and focusing a large portion of donors' funds on lobbying efforts, the Canadian Cancer Society (nationally and provincially) and CAPE are using the pesticides issue to raise their profiles and increase their revenues? While they are free to make that choice, it doesn't grant them the authority to decide which products consumers may use without any scientific proof or evidence.

Regardless of their motivation, the facts remain. A large proportion of British Columbians choose to use pesticides as part of their personal pest management tools. Health Canada has found these tools to be safe for use by individuals and so the ability to employ them should not be limited based on the unscientific, political arguments by organizations seeking to raise more money. Decisions such as these should continue to be made on the basis of sound science, thorough research and comprehensive evaluation by the scientific professionals all depend on to keep us safe.

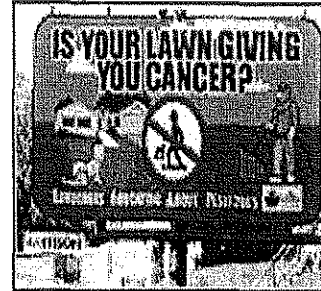

## No basis for pesticide bans

Cancer ranks among the most pervasive diseases of the Western world. In a recent report, the Canadian Cancer Society estimates that Canada will experience more than 134,000 new cases of cancer and more than 65,000 cancer related deaths in 2001. Breast cancer, one of the most commonly diagnosed cancers in women of the Western world, will affect almost 20,000 Canadian women in 2001, a new case diagnosed just about every 30 minutes in this country alone. All of us, whether women or men, will be affected by this disease - either as we receive the news of a diagnosis and begin to anticipate the horrors that will follow, or through supporting our wives, daughters, mothers and friends as they face the ordeal that lies ahead. Allegations about the causes and risk factors for cancer must always be treated seriously, and the scientific community must remain vigilant in searching out and thoroughly studying possible cause-and-effect relationships.



For decades, pesticides have attracted attention as possible cancer-causing agents. Allegations that pesticide exposure increases the risk of developing specific types of cancer, including breast in women, prostate in men and leukemia in children, abound. Well-intentioned interest groups allege a 25% increase in childhood cancers and alarming increases in adult cancers. Similarly, alleged associations between pesticide use and the increase in childhood asthma frequently lead to municipal restrictions or bans of pesticide use.

Yet the Canadian Cancer Society report found that, of all cancers that they analyzed, just two cancers among men and two among women have increased at an annual rate greater than 2% since 1988: cancers of the prostate and thyroid in men, and cancers of the lung and thyroid in women. Its report also notes that, while breast cancer in women has risen steadily, and gradually, over the past decade, the increase has been due, at least in part, to improved diagnostic techniques and province-wide mammographic screening programs. Lifestyle changes, such as the trend toward fewer and later full-term pregnancies, have also been factors. Similarly, increases in prostate cancer in men and thyroid cancer in both men and women are also almost certainly due to improvements in diagnosis and diagnostic techniques, including ultrasound and needle biopsy. Tragically, lung cancer increases in women followed their growing use of tobacco over the last few decades, an increase predicted to continue for some time to come.

The report found that rates for other cancer sites generally declined, noting that seven of the 10 most prevalent forms of cancer in Canadian men have actually declined since 1988. Of the three that have increased, the report suggests that prostate and thyroid can be explained, at least in large measure, by improved diagnostic techniques.

Of the 10 most prevalent forms of cancer among Canadian women, six have declined since 1988, and three of the remaining four (thyroid, lung and breast) appeared to be unrelated to any environmental risk factor. While overall cancer incidence among

all Canadians continues to climb, the report largely attributes this increase to the age structure and general aging of the Canadian population, a common trend in most developed countries.

The diagnosis of cancer in any Canadian immediately instills terror and fear, all the more so when the cancer afflicts a child. While allegations of 25% increases in childhood cancer rates abound in front-page news copy, the Laboratory Center for Disease Control of Health Canada, in cooperation with National Cancer Registry, report that overall childhood cancer rates in Canada have remained unchanged over the last 12 to 16 years (the period of study reported), and that specific rates for leukemia, bone, brain and other nervous system cancers in children, often alleged to be increasing in association with exposure to pesticides, have shown no increase at all. While the incidence of testicular cancer in young men has been increasing, the National Cancer Surveillance program states that an environmental risk factor is not likely.

More recently, allegations that pesticide exposure encourages childhood asthma have begun to emerge. While childhood asthma is most certainly a multi-factorial disease, a recent study has confirmed what allergists have known and argued for some time. In their August, 2000, article in the New England Journal of New Medicine, Thomas Ball and co-workers at the Day Care, Siblings and Asthma — Please, Sneeze on My Child, Dr. Sandra Christiansen of the Scripps Research Institute noted the importance of gene-environment interactions in the development of asthma, and factors such as smoking by parents, exposure to indoor allergens, absence of breast-feeding and a diet low in n-3 fatty acids to the development of the disease. Dr. Christiansen also cited the importance of a rural lifestyle, living on a farm with animals near the house, and the presence of a dog in providing a protective role.

Public debate on the safety and need for pesticides must continue. The government regulatory community, together with the regulated chemical industry, the academic research community and the general public must continue to identify and investigate important sources of risk and to move quickly to reduce and eliminate risks wherever practical and possible. Research to study particularly vulnerable, sensitive or highly exposed subsets of the population should be encouraged and supported.

But little is gained by advancing misleading hypotheses, supported by inaccurate and incorrect assumptions, in order to advance a specific interest or agenda, however well intentioned.

**Tree Protection Bylaw**

Chief Administrative Officer, Ted Tisdale noted that with the existing Tree Protection Bylaw there is no flexibility and as an example no authorization for owners to take down a tree that is causing structural or foundation damage.

**Beach Swim Rope**

Councillor Jackson noted that people should not have to receive a tree cutting permit to prune trees on their own property, or remove trees that cause or could cause structural damage to buildings.

**Sewer Sanitary Repair (I&I) Update**

Councillor Jackson suggested that the swim rope be extended to the end of Rendall park to discourage boats coming in and tying up to the beach and interfering with the swimmers. The Operations Manager will look into costing and report back to Council.

**Realty Signs**

Operations Manager, Ian Gardner informed Council that the I & I project has been completed and came in under budget.

Councillor Reyerse suggested that the Sign Bylaw be looked at for clarification and amended if necessary to discourage signs in front of the Village office, front entrance to Harrison and the corner of Hot Springs Road and Walnut.

**ISSUE:** To approve an application for funding for Water Utility Master Plan under the Gas Tax Agreement General Strategic Priorities Fund (GSPF) or Innovations Fund (IF).

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Village engineers have identified a project that is applicable to infrastructure planning work under the Gas Tax Agreement Capacity Building of Integrated Community Sustainability Planning Project. It would encompass a Water Model, an Infrastructure Engineering Assessment, an Infrastructure Structural Assessment (including the above-ground structural components up to the reservoir), and the creation of a 20-year Capital Works Plan and Financial Strategy including risk rankings and cost estimates.

If the Village was successful for full funding, this could be done by the Village Engineers. If the Village only got partial funding parts of it (ie. water model) this could be done; if no funding was approved, the project could be reevaluated. CTQ has indicated this would be a great start to the overall planning over the next 5 years.

CTQ have stated that fees to develop a Water Master Plan of this size would be approximately \$40K, with subconsultants for the structural, instrumentation and mechanical components adding another 10K.

The intake application deadline is May 31, 2012, however, I have been advised by the Program Assistant that Council approval can be attached to the application after the deadline.

**RECOMMENDATION:**

THAT staff be authorized to apply for grant funding under the Gas Tax Agreement General Strategic Priorities Fund (GSPF) and Innovations Fund (IF):

1. **Capacity Building or Integrated Community Sustainability Planning (ICS Planning)**

**Water Utility Master Plan**

THAT the Mayor and Corporate Officer be authorized to enter into an Agreement under the Gas Tax (GSPF) and (IF) programs.

**Being a Bylaw to establish a reserve fund for Community Works Fund Purposes.**

The Council of the Village of Harrison Hot Springs in open meeting assembled, HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:


1. There shall be and is hereby established a reserve fund, under the provisions of Section 188 of the Community Charter, to be known as the "Community Works Fund Reserve".
2. The moneys set aside shall be deposited in a separate bank account and, until required to be used, may be invested in the manner provided by the Community Charter.
3. Moneys in the Community Works Fund Reserve shall only be used for Eligible Projects as outlined in the agreement on the transfer of Federal Gas Tax Revenues under the New Deal for Cities & Communities between the Village of Harrison Hot Springs and the Union of British Columbia Municipalities.
4. This bylaw may be cited as the "Community Works Fund Reserve Bylaw No. 850, 2006".


