ISSUE: Request for local government approval for permanent status to a Temporary Expansion Service Area (TESA) Licence Application under Liquor and Cannabis Licencing Act

Regulation

BACKGROUND:

In May of 2020, LTK Investments Ltd. dba Old Settler Pub, requested local government approval for a COVID temporary extension for their liquor primary establishment. That opportunity had been made available by the Liquor and Cannabis Regulation Branch (LCRB) to support the hospitality industry's economic recovery through the COVID-19 pandemic. On June 1, 2020, Council approved and supported the application of the Old Settler Pub for a temporary extension. The temporary authorization is set to expire on March 31, 2023, however, the LCRB has invited Licencees who wish to obtain permanent status of an outdoor patio area to apply for permanent licencing.

As part of the application process, the LCRB requires Local Governments to review the application and gather public input from the community within the immediate vicinity of the establishment. Public notice was posted on April 13, 2022 on the public notice bulletin boards, Village website and posted on the affected establishment. The deadline for responses was May 2, 2022.

Council must receive any public comments and consider whether there is any impact of noise to nearby residents and on the community if the application is approved. The Village received one (1) comment.

The Old Settler Pub is proposing a structural change to the existing temporary outdoor patio licence which is currently 2688 sq. ft and has an occupant load of 100 persons. The patio area is entirely enclosed and must comply with the regulations under the Liquor and Cannabis Licencing Act. Their hours of business for the licence area will remain the same as the current licence from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m. Monday to Sunday.

Subject: Proposed application concern re: Old Settler permanent liquor licensing for patio

Hello,

I have a genuine concern with this licence and wish to raise the issue of this proposed application. As a community member, I find it unacceptable that the Old Settler Pub creating impactful noise pollution already, is allowed to take place so close to residential housing. With seating for 100 people on an outdoor patio, plus the loud industrial equipment noise their establishment creates, how does the village counsel think this type of pollution will affect their village residents? Please reconsider this application.

Noise pollution IS effecting your Harrison Hot Springs residents. Noise pollution is any unwanted or disturbing sound which can interfere with normal activities such as sleeping, conversation, communication, disrupt or diminish one's quality of life. If a council member were to come and stand in our back yard at 223 Miami River Drive you would hear the noise.

family and I have lived in the Miami River neighbourhood for 18 years. We have been good neighbours and felt until last, the Old Settler was too. However, it is apparent that the unacceptable noise pollution level coming from the Old Settlers is inconsiderate of the residents who live across the river from them.

Since last fall, I have made three complaints and was finally told that we have to live with the noise because the Old Settler is deemed industry. Does that mean industry can not be held accountable for their pollution of any kind regardless if it take place beside residential or not?

Since last summer, with new equipment installed, the Old Settle has been allowed to have loud machinery running continually 24 hours a day. The extremely loud industrial unit that causes incessant sound pollution is not an air conditioner we believed it to be; it runs in all seasons. Further, contrary to the investigation done by the bylaw officer, we were told:

- 'steps were taken by the owner.' This is false; there has been no change in the sound level since it was installed.
- the sound doesn't take place between 10pm and 8am. It is also false, it runs all night. I attempted to send a sound recording though was unsuccessful.

As explained in my previous complaints, I did not complain when they were first installed as it was mid pandemic and then fire season, which was not good for tourism. As a good neighbour and supporter of local businesses, I felt that we needed to tolerate both the noise for the temporary patio and air conditioning unit due to the heat due to businesses' hardships. This is no longer the case and the noise pollution needs to be addressed before a permanent licence is issued.

This loud noise needs to be dealt with along with the generated pub noise- currently, there are no controls for either.

The World Health Organization recently found people's exposure to sound levels can significantly damage health. Living in the vicinity of this noise will seriously harming residents health and I ask you as our local government officials to reconsider this application.

VILLAGE OF HARRISON HOT SPRINGS POLICY

COUNCIL	POLICY NO. 1.36
FLAG	DATE ADOPTED: MARCH 1, 2021 AMENDMENT:

1. PURPOSE

This policy has been developed to ensure that all flags flown at the Village Office and on other properties and/or at facilities owned and operated by the Village of Harrison Hot Springs are flown and displayed in a consistent and appropriate manner.

2. SCOPE

This policy applies to all flags flown by the Village of Harrison Hot Springs.

3. CUSTOMARY FLAG CONFIGURATION

- a. The order of precedence for flags is:
 - The national flag of Canada
 - The flags of other sovereign nations in alphabetical order (if applicable)
 - The flags of the provinces of Canada (in the order in which they joined Confederation)
 - The flags of the territories of Canada (in the order in which they joined Confederation)
 - The flags of municipalities (Harrison Hot Springs first, then alphabetical)
- b. When three flags are flown together, the position of honour is the centre flag pole. When any other number of flags are flown together (i.e. two flags or more than three flags) the position of honour is furthest to the left (to an observer facing the display).
- c. In a three-flag configuration, the Canadian flag will be flown on the center flagpole, with the Province of BC flag flown to the left of the Canadian flag, and the Village of Harrison Hot Springs flag flown to the right (to an observer facing the display).
- d. Flags may be temporarily changed to accommodate a facility rental for filming opportunity at the Village Office or at operated municipal properties, at the discretion of the Chief Administration Officer (CAO) or designate.

4. HALF-MASTING OF FLAGS

- a. Half-masting of flags is a symbol of honour and expresses a collective sense of sorrow and loss while sending a strong visual message of mourning.
- b. Half-masting may occur simultaneously at all Village facilities or at key sites only, such as the Village Office, Civic Plaza, Memorial Hall, or at the discretion of the CAO or designate. When one flag is flown at half-mast, all flags flown together should be at halfmast.
- c. All flags will be flown at half-mast at one or more Village facilities to mark periods of official mourning upon the death of one of the following people:
 - the British Sovereign or member of the Royal Family related in the first degree to the British Sovereign,
 - the Canadian Governor General or a former Governor General,
 - the Canadian Prime Minister or a former Prime Minister,
 - a Canadian Federal Cabinet Minister from British Columbia,
 - the Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia,
 - · the Premier of British Columbia,
 - · a Member of Parliament from British Columbia,
 - a Member of the British Columbia Legislative Assembly,
 - · a Senator from British Columbia,
 - · the Mayor or Councillor of Harrison Hot Springs,
 - a former Mayor or Councillor of Harrison Hot Springs, on the advice of the Corporate Officer,
 - · the Chief or Councillor of Sts'ailes,
 - a former Chief or Councillor of Sts'ailes, on the advice of the Sts'ailes Administration,
 - a local first responder (paramedics, police officers, special constables, firefighters, and rescuers) in the line of duty,
 - upon direction of the Mayor, any person to be honoured.
- d. All flags will be flown at half-mast at one or more Village facilities in observance of the following:
 - April 9, Vimy Ridge Day;
 - April 28, Day of Mourning for Persons Killed or Injured in the Workplace (Workers' Mourning Day);
 - June 23, National Day of Remembrance for Victims of Terrorism;
 - Second Sunday in September, Firefighters' National Memorial Day;
 - Last Sunday in September, Police and Peace Officers' National Memorial Day;

- September 30, National Day for Truth and Reconciliation (flags lowered to halfmast for one entire week prior to this day);
- November 11, Remembrance Day;
- December 6, National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women;
- e. In the case of a death, flags will be flown at half-mast during the official period of mourning, which is defined as the day of death until five calendar days have passed.
- f. Flags shall first be raised to the top of the staff then lowered to half-staff.
- g. If the flags are half-masted due to a death, they must nonetheless be flown at full-mast on Canada Day and Victoria Day, after which the flags can resume half-masting until the end of the official period of mourning.
- h. The Corporate Officer is responsible for coordinating the lowering of flags at Village facilities.
- i. When half-masting has been deemed appropriate, the Corporate Officer or designate will notify the following persons by email:
 - Mayor and Council;
 - The manager responsible for Operations, to arrange for the half-masting of flags as identified;
 - The manager responsible for the Communications to arrange for notification of the half-masting on the website;
 - The Fire Chief to arrange for half-masting of the flags at the Fire Hall (when relevant); and
 - The Corporate Management Team (for information).

5. STS'AILES FIRST NATION

- a. The Sts'ailes First Nation flag will fly to the right of the Village of Harrison Hot Springs Flag in the Civic Plaza.
- b. All applicable procedures in this policy will apply to the Sts'ailes First Nation flag.

6. REMOVAL OF FLAGS

- a. Flags on Village property will be maintained in good condition and replaced when showing signs of wear, tear or discolouration.
- b. Flags removed from service will be disposed of in a dignified manner and immediately replaced.

OVERALL ENGAGEMENT APPROACH UPDATE



Village's Website – the site has been created and is live. The address for the site is outlined below OCP Village Vision | Harrison Hot Springs

In-person Pop-Up Events – held on April 5 and 6. This event attracted 35 people over the two days and with our discussions on various issues we directed

the residents to the second survey site. We are looking to setting a second pop-up event over the summer.

SUMMARY COMMENTS ON THE TWO SURVEYS

First Survey Summary results

This survey was active from Feb 1 to Feb 28, 2022, and we had 140 responses (130 residing in Harrison Hot Springs and 10 residing away from Harrison Hot Springs). In addition to the 140 responses, we had on the survey, the following statistics on this survey are provided for your information.

- A. Aware of the survey (defined as visiting at least one page) 302
- B. Informed (defined as downloading a document, visiting multiple pages, or responded to the survey) 231
- C. Engaged (defined as responding to the survey or placing a pin on places) 142. Please note that we had 218 visitors to the survey section and 140 responded.

Second Survey Summary Results

This survey was active from April 4 to April 29, 2022, and we had 84 responses. In addition to the 84 responses, we had on the survey, the following statistics on this survey are provided for your information.

- A. Aware of the survey (defined as visiting at least one page) 181
- B. Informed (defined as downloading a document, visiting multiple pages, or responded to the survey) – 103
- C. Engaged (defined as responding to the survey) 84

Attached to this report are two reports, one dealing with the responses that could be quantified and the second is the write-in comments of the survey. I draw you attention to page 13 of 16 of the quantified responses. This question has been cut off, in the project report only, but asked the following;

"The provincially created Community Wildfire Protection Plan process was started as a result of the devasting fires in Kelowna in 2003. In this plan, a toolbox of options is recommended to help reduce the threat of wildfires coming into and away from a community. One of these local tools is the use of a development permit, as outlined in the *Local Government Act*. This allows the Village to require additional information before the development may proceed. Do you think that the Village should set up a Wildfire Interface Development Permit tool?"

The results of this question indicate overwhelming support for the creation of a new Wildfire Interface Development Permit tool for the Village.

Attached for your review and information are the summary results of the write-in comments. Please note that the comments provided appeared at least once and are not listed in any order. In addition to this the comments provided are not always OCP specific, but it is important that Council, staff, and residents can review the comments provided.

The review team will be reviewing the comments provided for further discussion at the World Café sessions.

OVERALL COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION STATISTICS TO DATE

The breakdown for the community involvement to date is as follows;

- A. Aware of the survey (defined as visiting at least one page) 483
- B. Informed (defined as downloading a document, visiting multiple pages, or responded to the survey) -334
- C. Engaged (defined as responding to the survey) 224
- D. Pop-up event 35

For the World Café we are setting up for 48 participants for each session. For a total of 96 participants over the two days.

OVERALL COMMENTS ON THE COMMUNITY INPUT RECEIVED TO DATE

Looking at the comments received to date suggests so far that there is still considerable support for the current vision and the goals of the current OCP. After the World Café session, we will be in a better position to determine if we need to revise the current vision statement and the supporting ten goals.

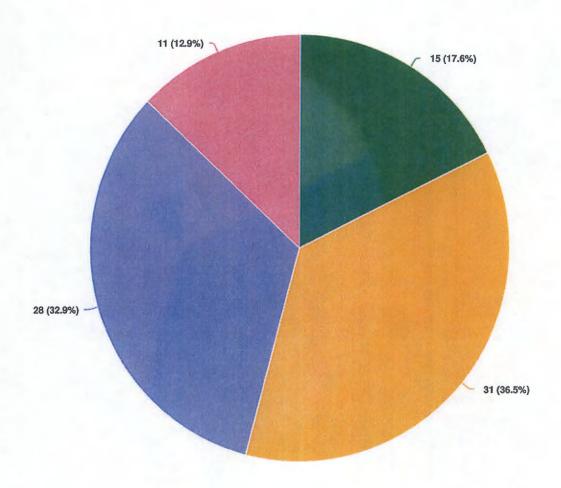

As a pedestrian, what level of personal safety do you feel on major roads during the day?

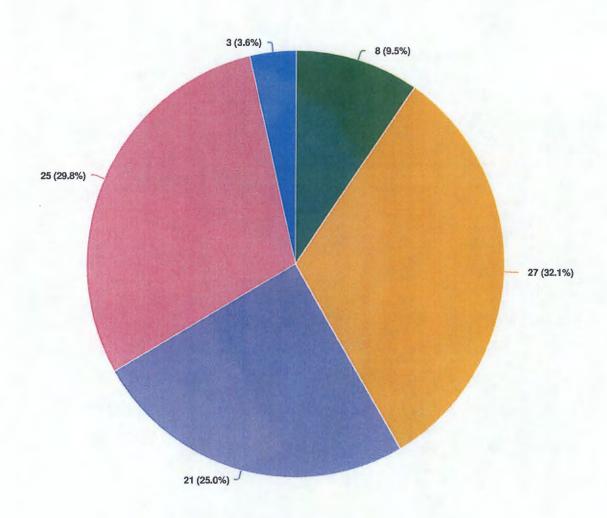




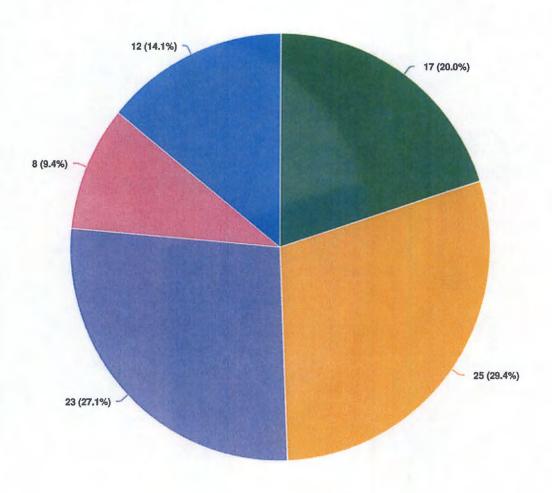


What level of personal safety do you feel in parks during the night?








As a pedestrian, what level of personal safety do you feel on local roads during the day?







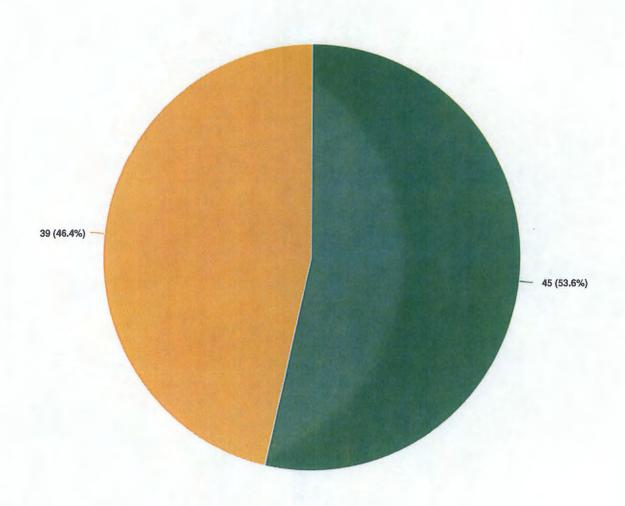



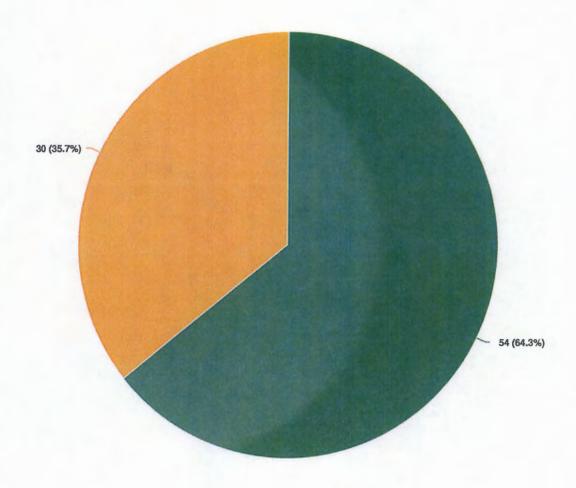

SUBJECT: Water Reservoir Maintenance

ISSUE:

The Water Reservoir requires a new cathodic protection system and general maintenance.

BACKGROUND:

The Harrison Hot Springs Water Reservoir, constructed in 2008, stores the Village's potable water supply for domestic water distribution and fire flow purposes. The cathodic protection system designed to protect the reservoir from corrosion has reached the end of its useful life so the system requires replacement. In addition, the reservoir requires general maintenance and repairs.

The scope of required work includes the installation of 18 new anodes assembles, reservoir cleaning, and general maintenance and repairs. The reservoir will need to remain empty (7-8 days) while the maintenance work is completed however the Village's potable water and fire protection will remain in service for the duration.

Greaterio Services is the exclusive Canadian dealer, installer and service provider of the Village's reservoir infrastructure. Accordingly, it is recommended that Greaterio Services be awarded the contract to supply and install the replacement anodes and additional maintenance and repair works.

The reservoir anode replacement and reservoir maintenance project is expected to cost up to \$88,000.00 and will be funded by water utility reserves.

RECOMMENDATION:

THAT Greaterio Services be retained to undertake the purchase, installation and related works for the reservoir anode replacement and reservoir maintenance project for up to \$88,000.00 to be funded from water utility reserves.
